Minister visits Castlemilk Park

Our work on improving access and community involvement in Castlemilk Park woodlands was praised by Scotland's environment minister during a recent visit.

The Environment, Biodiversity and Land Reform Minister, Mairi McAllan, said: "The work being carried out here by local volunteers is getting more people involved in their local woodland and green space. It's a great example of what can be achieved right in the heart of an urban area."

During the visit the Minister spoke to many of the Castlemilk Park volunteers who were working hard to maintain the pathways and tackle invasive species.

She also asked about the pond area as she could see this was an area that was causing concern.
As well as representatives from



Cassiltoun, the meeting was also attended by representatives of Forestry Scotland, who have part funded the Woodland Officer and other woodland related programmes and representatives from Glasgow City Council who own and manage the Park.

Lifting of Covid restrictions

- impact on the services you receive from Cassiltoun

On 9th August, the Scottish Government announced that Scotland was 'beyond level 0' on the Covid roadmap.

This signalled a lifting of the majority of the restrictions that had been put in place to control the spread of Covid-19.

Cassiltoun HA has continued to deliver many of its services to our tenants and wider community throughout the pandemic and lockdown and prior to 9th August we were already providing community activities, welfare advice, allocating homes, completing repairs, building new homes and putting in place plans for investment work in some of our properties. This new lifting of restrictions now enables us to have more staff in the office, have more in person meetings and offer tenants increased opportunities to meet with the staff team. Initially the building will have limited opening hours (9-12 and 1-4 Monday to Friday closed on Wednesday afternoon). The Association is following strict infection control measures with staff

wearing masks as they move around the building, cleaning surfaces and increased ventilation.

Although the doors to the Stables are now open we are asking visitors/tenants:

- to make an appointment before coming to the Stables
- wear a mask (unless exempt)
- sanitise hands on entry and exit from the building
- do not come into the office if you are feeling unwell/have been told to isolate or have been in close contact with someone with Covid-19.

You will have received a letter from us with these details. These are constantly under review as restrictions are put in place or lifted and dependant on staffing levels. If we need to make any unplanned changes we will put details on our Social Media sites.

The View from the Drive

If you have been anywhere near Castlemilk Drive in the last few months the fantastic progress being made with our new build development will have no doubt caught your eye.

The Association is looking forward to adding 60 new flats to the housing stock, with the first handovers due in September 2021 and full completion by May 2022. All of these one and two bedroom flats have been designed to meet Glasgow City Council's 'Glasgow Standard' – giving tenants warm, affordable homes that have great space standards, plenty of cupboard space and high quality bathrooms and kitchens.

There are fantastic views over the city. We can't wait to allocate these homes as we know they are going to be a big hit with the new residents. For anyone worried about the impact on parking on an already busy road, we can advise that there is private parking for the residents to the rear of the buildings.

As part of ensuring that our investment in 'bricks and mortar' also helps the local economy, we have secured a painterwork apprenticeship on the site for a Castlemilk resident, along with two labourers and a cleaner. The contractor, Crudens, have carried out some other goodwill gestures such as building the Cassiltoun Stables Nursery a stage to ensure their 'little graduates' could pass out in style! We have also received a cash donation of £9,000 which our communities team are putting to the best use for local initiatives.

Crudens have also started with groundworks at their own private development of 32 units on Machrie Road. They have advised that their subcontractor, Cuchulain, have received permission from the local Council to carry out works on Machrie Road in order that new drainage can be installed. This is going to involve road closure at Machrie Road and diversions through the estate for all of September and October. Prep: 5 mins Level: Easy Serves: 4 Cook: 20 mins

Ingredients

- 400g spaghetti
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 120g smoked streaky bacon, sliced into matchsticks
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 1 garlic clove, finely chopped
- 2 tsp sweet smoked paprika
- 2 x 400g cans chopped tomatoes
- grated parmesan, to serve (optional)

Method

Step 1

Bring a large pan of water to the boil and cook the spaghetti following pack instructions. Meanwhile, heat the oil in a large non-stick frying pan and cook the bacon for 3-4 mins until just starting to crisp. Stir in the onion and cook for another 3-4 mins, then add the garlic and smoked paprika, and cook for 1 min more.

Step 2

Pour in the chopped tomatoes, bring to the boil and bubble for about 5 mins until thickened, stirring every so often to stop it catching on the bottom. Drain the pasta and toss with the sauce. Serve with Parmesan, if you like.



SHR Complaints and Significant Performance Failures

If you are unhappy about the services you receive or have concerns about the way your landlord is operating, you have the right to make a complaint.

The SHR Complaints and Significant Performance Failures leaflet details the difference between a complaint and a significant performance failure, and lets you know what to do and who to contact.

Bulky Waste Glasgow Collection

Glasgow City Council introduced charges for the collection of household bulky waste on 5th July 2021.

Residents will be able to place requests online by first registering with "myaccount". Full details and guidance is at www.glasgow.gov.uk/bulkywaste

- GCC will provide a limited phone line initially for 3 days a week for residents who cannot access the internet.
- Payment can be made by credit or debit card on our secure site and will be taken upfront.
- Residents will be provided with terms and conditions which provide information on their rights and obligations.
- Charges are:
 - £35 for up to 10 standard items (£35 for each number up to 10 thereafter)
 - £35 for each large electrical item these will be collected separately for recycling
 - Special large items such as marble fireplaces, sheds, cast iron baths will continue to be charged on a half-hourly basis. A full list is available on our website.
- Residents will first be issued an acknowledgement and will then receive a follow up notification with a Collection Date we aim to collect items within 28 days.
- Where we have been unable to collect for operational reasons, we will arrange a new Collection Date.
- More information including full terms and conditions, FAQs, lists of items we collect, how and where to present items, is on our website www.glasgow.gov.uk/bulkywaste
- Residents can continue to visit our Household Waste Recycling Centres, and if items are in good condition, residents can also use Zero Waste Scotland's National Re-use Tool and do-nate these items to charity. The link is here: https://wasteless.zerowastescotland.org.uk/articles/reuse-tool

I started with Cassiltoun Housing Association at the age of 16 through a Community Jobs Scotland placement for a period of 9 months. This was instrumental to me in deciding to pursue a career in housing, especially with Cassiltoun Housing Association as they have an amazing staff team.

Once I heard there was a temporary Customer Services Assistant position available, I knew that I had to apply for it. I was successful and started back at Cassiltoun in May 2021. A permanent position then became available and thankfully I was successful in securing a permanent contract.

As a Customer Service Assistant, it is pivotal to provide the best customer service possible as this is a reflection on Cassiltoun Housing

Association. I monitor tenants rent accounts as well as conducting housing options interviews with people who are looking to be rehoused. It is also important to understand Cassiltoun's allocation policy so that I can allocate the correct amount of points to the applicant's circumstances. I also take and process repairs from tenants from emergency repairs such as no heating or hot water to minor repairs.

My favourite part of the job is engaging with Cassiltoun's tenants. I am from Castlemilk myself so helping people in my community is something that I love doing and I have done since I was 16. It will be very exciting once the tenants are allowed back into the building.



How to become a Board member.

Our Board of Management is made up of up to 15 Members and includes a Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary and Treasurer. These positions are filled annually after every AGM.

We currently have 10 board members.



The Board of Management are responsible for the strategic direction of the Association. They monitor performance, set standards and ensure compliance against the Scottish Housing Regulator's Regulatory Framework.

To become a board member, you must be a member of the Association. This membership entitles you to stand for election to our Board of Management. All board members are elected onto our Board at the Association's Annual General Meeting.

To become a Board member, you first of all have to be a share member.

Major Repairs -Investment

I am pleased to report that our investment programme for 2020/21 is currently underway and we are still on track to complete our 2021/22 programme also.

We have concluded the window contract at Barlia Drive with 60 properties getting new UPVC windows. Front main doors and front doors of flats were also fitted. The tenants were delighted with the quality of the work and tenants have commented on how much quieter it is now they have the new windows fitted and also how much warmer their homes are.

We are currently surveying 15 properties in Castlemilk Drive (the

main doors) for new kitchens and rewiring. Once completed this will conclude our 2020/21 programme.

The first part of our 2021/22 programme is currently underway with window and door surveys underway in the Ballantay Road and Hoddam Terrace. The main door properties in Ballantay road will receive new windows and doors whilst the flats will receive new windows for their homes and the common close area. The contractor for this work is Sidey who successfully completed our 2020/21 programme. All affected tenants will be contacted regarding a survey date followed by an installation date.



In order to complete the programme we are working closely with our Kitchen contractor MCN to supply and fit 41 kitchens in the Cavin area, with the rest of the properties there being completed in 2022/23. We hope to begin this work no later than January 2022. Those tenants affected will be contacted in due course for survey dates, to choose their kitchens (worktops, doors etc). Please do not contact the Association directly. We will contact you.

This year the Association will spend approximately £1m on our homes to ensure that our properties remain compliant with the Scottish Housing Quality Standard but more importantly so that our tenants have a warm, safe and secure home in which to live.


The Association's arrears were **3.75%**. The Association treats non-payment of rent very seriously and takes all necessary action to recover moneys owed.



Advice Team/pdate

As we return to the office the Advice Team will continue to provide advice and assistance to our tenants and factored owners.

Since March 2020 our team have been working from home providing a telephone service and as we return to office we will continue to work this way. This has been extremely successful and well received by clients using the service. By continuing to work this way means we can assist as many people as possible and ensures our clients' health and wellbeing are our top priority.

If you have been contacted by Test and Protect service or Protect Scotland APP to self-isolate as a result of COVID-19 because you have tested positive for coronavirus or have been recently in contact with someone who has tested positive you can apply to self-isolation fund.

This is being delivered by Glasgow City Council Scottish Welfare Fund to assist individuals and families with financial assistance if they need to isolate and will lose income. The grant if successful will pay £500.00.

You must be employed or self-employed; and be unable to work from home and can show that you will lose earnings as a result; and at least one of the following:

Currently receiving, or been awarded but not yet received a payment of at least one of the following benefits, or your income is such that you would ordinarily be entitled to Universal Credit should an application have been made prior to your isolation:

- Universal Credit;
- Working Tax Credit;
- Income-based Employment and Support Allowance;
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance;
- Income Support;
- Housing Benefit;
- Pension Credit;
- Means-tested Council Tax Reduction;

Be an individual who earns less than the income levels provided by the Scottish Government; or

Whose household income is less than the income levels provided by the Scottish Government.

To check income levels, visit www.mygov.scot/glasgow-city-sisg

To apply for a Self-Isolation Support Grant, you will need to provide:

- a bank statement; and proof of low income if you are not in receipt of a listed benefit
- proof of employment or, if you are selfemployed, evidence of self-assessment returns, trading income and proof that your business delivers services which cannot be undertaken without social contact.

If you have been asked to self-isolate on the Protect Scotland app, please follow the instructions to "Send a Certificate". Add your postcode for the certificate to be sent automatically to the council. The certificate is proof that you need to self-isolate.

Self-isolation payments of £500 are taxable. If you're employed, you'll pay tax on the payment if you go over your tax-free personal allowance. Your tax code will change to collect the tax. You will not pay National Insurance contributions on the payment. If you're self-employed you must report the payment on your Self-Assessment tax return.

Children Winter Heating Allowance

Child Winter Heating Assistance is a new benefit from the Scottish Government.

It's a payment of £200 for children and young people up to the age of 18. To get the payment they must meet two criteria on at least one day in the third full week of September (called the "qualifying week"). On that day they must:

- get the highest rate care component of Disability Living Allowance for children
- be resident in Scotland

In 2020, the qualifying week began on Monday 21 September. If there is more than one child or young person in your household who qualifies, they will all get the payment.

You will not need to show receipts or proof of how the money is spent.

If a child or young person did not live in Scotland during the qualifying week, you might still get the payment if you:

- live in Switzerland or a European Economic Area (EEA) country
- or you have a genuine and sufficient link to Scotland

You do not need to apply for the payment if the child currently lives in Scotland. If the child or young person is eligible, you'll be paid automatically into the same account that your Disability Living Allowance for children is paid into.

You'll get a letter from Social Security Scotland before the payment is made.

Warm Home Discount

You could get £140 off your electricity bill under the Warm Home Discount Scheme.

The money is not paid to you - it's a one-off discount on your electricity bill, between October and March.

You may be able to get the discount on your gas bill instead if your supplier provides you with both gas and electricity.

Eligibility

There are 2 ways to qualify for the Warm Home Discount Scheme:

 If you get the Guarantee Credit element of Pension Credit this is known as the 'core group'

If you receive this benefit and your supplier is part of the scheme you'll receive a letter between October and December 2021 telling you how to get the discount if you qualify.

Your letter will say if you need to call the helpline by 28 February 2022 to confirm your details.

Your electricity supplier will apply the discount to your bill by 31 March 2021.

If you are on a low income or you get certain means-tested benefits, this is known as the 'broader group'. You have to apply directly to your electricity supplier for help if you do not get the Guarantee Credit element of Pension Credit.

To get the discount you'll need to stay with your supplier until it's paid.

Check with your supplier as early as possible. The number of discounts suppliers can give are limited.

Your electricity supplier will apply the discount to your bill by 31 March 2022.

Pre-pay or pay-as-you-go meters

You can still qualify for the discount if you use a pre-pay or pay-as-you-go electricity meter.

Your electricity supplier can tell you how you'll get the discount if you're eligible, for example a voucher you can use to top up your meter.

Each supplier has discretion on closing date and eligibility criteria

The scheme is due to open Summer 2021 for most suppliers so check with your supplier or contact Money Advice Team @ The Stables 59 Machrie Road, telephone 0141 634 2673 for assistance.

Low Income Pandemic Payment

The Scottish Government announced that a one-off £130 Low Income Pandemic Payment (LIPP) would be made by 31 October 2021 to eligible households. The payment will be made if you were in receipt of Council Tax Reduction/Second Adult Rebate, or did not pay Council Tax for one of the following reasons during the month of **April 2021**:

- You were living in temporary accommodation, including a refuge.
- Your home was unoccupied because you were being cared for or were caring for someone else.
- All members of the household were care leavers, under 18 or severely mentally impaired.

Glasgow City Council has identified those eligible for this payment and they will be contacted in due course, there is no need to take any action.

Scottish Childa Payment

Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family. It's a weekly payment of £10 that you can get for every child you look after who's under 6 years of age. You'll get the payment every 4 weeks if your application is successful.

Scottish Child Payment does not affect any other UK or Scottish Government benefits that you, or any person in your household currently get.

You may be able to get Scottish Child Payment if all of the following apply:

- you live in Scotland
- you or your partner are getting certain benefits or payments
- you or your partner are the main person looking after a child who's under 6 years old

You can apply whether you're in work or not, as long as you're getting one or more of the following benefits:

- Universal Credit
- · Child Tax Credit
- · Working Tax Credit

- Income Support
- Income-Based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-Related Employment and Support Allowance
- Pension Credit

If you're not getting any of these benefits or payments, but have applied for one, you can still apply for Scottish Child Payment.

You MUST make an application, unlike other benefits from the Scottish Government.

Applications for Scottish Child Payment can be made by calling **0800 182 2222**. Alternatively, you can claim on-line at

mygov.scot/scottish-child-payment/how-to-apply.



New Child Disability Payment will be the first application-based disability benefit to be introduced by Scottish Government. The New Child Disability Premium will replace Child Disability Living Allowance.

Scottish Government have started a pilot in three areas and will confirm when applications can be made for Glasgow area for new claims for this benefit.

Child Disability Payment will provide money to help with the extra care and mobility costs children and young people with a disability may have, up to the age of 18

People who currently get disability benefits from DWP will have their awards transferred to the new Scottish system in stages after the new benefits are introduced. This work is expected to be completed 2025

Introduction of Child Disability Payments will mean young people and children in Scotland who are currently getting Disability Living Allowance for children from the DWP will no longer need to apply for PIP when they turn 16.
